Reflection From Our Director

This has definitely been a year of change for the Alamance County Public Libraries, not to say that each year won't continue to change as quickly as things seemed to this year. Starting the year off with a bang, we successfully got permission to no longer charge overdue fines - removing that barrier from past and future library accounts! Wonderfully, this resulted in 10,827 new borrowers, a 35% increase over last year, and over 2,000 long lost and overdue items being returned.

Soon after that, we rolled out new operating hours across the May Memorial, Graham, and Mebane Libraries. Patrons no longer scramble to remember which branch is open until which time on which day of the week.

In October 2021, we began our Mobile Library service. This is the culmination of four years of hard work, fundraising and seeking support to start this new service. Happily, we saw over 600 patrons in the first month, and ended the fiscal year having served 244 stops and seeing over 2,500 visitors. Our Mobile Café had a good year as well, even through staffing shortages, seeing 897 visitors, participating in fourteen events, and giving out over 750 books.

Throughout the year we were thrilled to be able to provide the services, resources, and programs that our community needs. We experienced over **250,000 library visitors** through our doors and **checked out almost 450,000 items**.

Patrons were happy to have access to computers and study areas again, which was reflected in the 33,051 - Public Library Computer Uses and 25,677 - Wi-Fi uses for the year. Total public or personal device usage resulted in a 196% increase over FY 20-21 and was only a 40% decrease from our pre-COVID FY 2018-2019. This shows that while many personal habits did change due to COVID, the need for access and connectivity remains critical in Alamance County.

Through the hiring and retention challenges, the seemingly never-ending impact of COVID, and the eventual slow return to 'normality', we offered up and participated in over 700 programs and events, seeing over 31,000 participants.

Summer Reading programs are running strong through the middle of our fiscal year change and give us a good idea of the returning interest of our community to get involved with each other again. We look forward to the year and changes to come!

May Memorial Library Alamance County Public Libraries



The first public library serving Burlington was located in Broad Street High School in the early 1920s. By 1937, the public library had moved to temporary quarters in a storefront located on Main Street. In 1938, industrialist W.H. May, Sr. and his two sons donated \$15,000 towards the purchase of the old U.S. Post Office for use as a public library. This building was constructed in 1918 and stands at the corner of E. Davis and S. Spring Street.

May Memorial Library opened for business on June 2, 1938. At that time, only the main floor fronting on S. Spring St. was in use. In 1945, a Seth Thomas grandfather clock was donated to the library by Col. Eugene Holt, grandson of textile magnate E.M. Holt. It quickly became a much-beloved symbol of the library within the community. In 1955, the basement floor with an entrance on E. Davis Street was remodeled and opened to the public.

By the 1960s, Alamance and Chatham counties had signed a formal cooperation agreement to become the Central N.C. Regional Library with May Memorial Library as its headquarters. In 1981 a new library wing with approximately 4,600 square feet of additional space on the main floor was opened and the basement and second floor of the library were given over to staff work areas. In the late 1990s, local textile CEO Allen Gant, Jr. of Glen Raven, Inc. offered an adjacent building, the former Sears Department Store, to the City of Burlington to expand the public library. The original 1918 building and 1981 addition were linked as one wing with the 1950s Sears building as the other wing connected by a vaulted ceiling entryway and officially opened November 17, 2000.

Graham Public Library Alamance County Public Libraries



The opening of the Graham Public Library as an extension of the May Memorial Library was the highlight of library service in 1967 in Alamance County. Through a partnership with the City of Graham and the board of the May Memorial Library, the Graham Public Library opened in September 1967 in the Graham City Hall as a 3,000 square foot facility with more than 5,000 books. In 1969, the Stokes family was commemorated for the monetary gift made by the Stokes children in honor of Mr. and Mrs. William T. Stokes, which made the Graham Library possible.

In 1994, a two million dollar project was approved to construct, equip and furnish two new Graham facilities: the Graham Public Library and the Graham Police Department. Scheduled to be completed in 240 days, both buildings were placed south of the municipal building; the police department off of Maple Street and the library off of Main Street. The new 10,500 square foot library, which is more than three times the size of the original library, opened its doors on Monday, July 31, 1995.

Mebane Public Library Alamance County Public Libraries




In 1935 the idea that started the Mebane Public Library began with a local literary club, the Reviewers. Through their efforts in recruiting support and funds, the small beginning of the Mebane Public Library was made possible by Mr. E. M. Yoder, Principal of the Mebane Public School in 1936. Members of the Reviewers Club served as library clerks in the small room in the school. The official Mebane Public Library opened in December 1936 in the Commerical & Farmer's Bank Building, situated at the corner of Clay and North Fourth Streets.

In the Fall of 1941, the building owners offered to sell the building to the City of Mebane for the permanent home of the library. Through the efforts of local civic club fundraising, the building was purchased without the use of any tax payer funds. In 1975, the library moved into a 5,000 square foot space in the back of the Mebane Town Hall.

By the late 1990s, the windowless space at the Mebane City Hall had become cramped and library use had outgrown the space. In the early 2000s the idea to refurbish a vacant mill building revitalized the community. Built in 1919 as Durham Hosiery and changing hands over the years to become Dixie Yarns in the 30s and R.L. Stowe Mills until 2001, the renovated space offered three times the capacity for the new Mebane Public Library and opened its doors on November 7, 2005.

North Park Library Alamance County Public Libraries



The North Park Community Center was built by the City of Burlington in 1978 with funds from the federal Housing and Community Development Act. Initial partnering organizations operating part-time from the new facility included the Burlington Police Department's Crime Prevention Bureau, the Alamance-Caswell Area Mental Association, the Alamance County Health Department and the N.C. Central Regional Library.

On May 15, the North Park Library opened in a small room (approximately 300 square feet) of the community center and offered 'listening posts,' special programs, a story hour and a small collection of books and materials.

As popularity grew, a meeting room space was added to the library's availability, doubling the size to approximately 600 square feet. This allowed for more materials and the eventual addition of public computer space. In 2015, the City of Burlington began renovation projects in North Park. Early efforts provided new carpet and a reorganization of resources. Later efforts included a brand new entrance within the atrium of the community center.

MOBILE LIBRARY

Alamance County Public Libraries

In 1938, a county bookmobile began its service in Alamance. Carrying 400 books in a converted light-delivery truck, a three-week rotation of deliveries was established.

By 1951, a second vehicle increased capacity to 1,600 books and records, making deliveries to 83 stops every two weeks. The next thirty years of continuous bookmobile service continued to grow and thrive in Alamance County until the last vehicle couldn't be replaced in the late 70s/early 80s.

In 2021, ACPL took possession of our new, high-tech Mobile Library! We then began running a designated route in October 2021, serving over 40 stops on a three-week schedule with appearances at special community events as well!



While we're not quite back to pre-COVID numbers, seeing 246,283 library visitors is a vast improvement to previous years. Reminding citizens that libraries are once again operating normally is our continued goal.




FY 2020-2021 showed a total of 305,626 items checked out. In FY 2021-2022, it was 488,700, an increase of 60%. This is an excellent first year recovery from the impact COVID had on patron habits. With the 10,827 new library card users during the year, we expect to see a continued increase of material checkouts, computer use, and program attendance.



Computers & Technology

ACPL is proud to offer access to public computers during all operating hours. Wi-fi is available 24/7. In 2020, we circulating hotspots began on a twenty-eight day check-out for anyone unable to access the Internet from their homes. We also provide printing in-house and from mobile (both devices), faxing, scanning and copying services.



NC LIVE - offers citizens of North Carolina online access to complete articles from over 10,000 newspapers, journals, magazines, and encyclopedias, indexing for over 20,000 periodical titles, and access to over 24,000 electronic books. NC LIVE is available free of charge to library patrons, both in the library and remotely.

Online Job & Career Training Resources

ACPL staff offer virtual, in-person, and pre-recorded programs that are advertised and shared through social media and YouTube on Job and Career tools and other available wide resources. Every Child Ready to Read is an initiative created by the Public Library Association and the Association for Library Service to Children to encourage parents, as their child(ren)'s first teacher, to participate in enrichment activities that create the building blocks for reading.

1,000 Books Before Kindergarten

Studies have shown that by age three, a child's brain has reached 80 percent of its adult volume. Early experiences and interactions are a key factor in a child's brain development. Early literacy skills have a lifelong impact on educational and occupational success. We challenge parents and guardians to participate and win prizes in reading 1,000 books to their children before kindergarten.




